PROVINCIAL-WIDE PROPERTY REVALUATION

FOR 2017

By now, you will have received your Assessment Notice for 2017. This year, all properties in Saskatchewan were reassessed. This adjustment is done every four years and this particular year is bringing the base values up to 2015 values; closer to the amount of what you would receive if you sold your home. SAMA (Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency) is the agency who assesses the Town of Balgonies' properties.

THIS IS NOT YOUR TAX NOTICE!

During budget deliberations, Council took into account the higher assessments. They lowered the mill rate from 7 mils to 5 mils and kept the base tax the same as last year. Council budgeted with only a 1% higher municipal tax levy than 2016 - basically <u>revenue neutral</u>. Revenue neutral is a taxing procedure that allows the government (Council) to still receive the same amount of money in order to run the town efficiently, despite changes in tax laws.

The values on land for the 2017 revaluation changed dramatically, improvements to your property also will have increased your assessment and if your new home was not fully assessed in 2016, it may also have changed the assessment for 2017.

To calculate the property tax, the authority - in this case the Town of Balgonie - multiplies the taxable assessed value by the mill rate and then divides by 1,000. The base tax is then added to that amount and then the same calculation for the school division is added to that.

The Town is ONLY the collector of the school taxes for the division. The Town does not set their mill rate, but we are told by the Provincial Government what the school rate mill rate will be set at.

VALUES FOR 2017

Since the 2013 Revaluation and its base date of January 1, 2011, the province of Saskatchewan continued to experience substantial economic growth, and the value of property in the province is no exception.

The result of this active and strong real estate market in Saskatchewan will bring with it significant increases to property assessments that will be reported with the 2017 Revaluation.

Based on provincial averages, preliminary numbers indicate that **arable and non-arable agricultural** properties will, on average, be increasing approximately 2.1 to 2.2 times over their assessed values from the 2013 Revaluation. This reflects the change in agricultural land selling prices between January 1, 2011 (the base date for the 2013 revaluation) and January 1, 2015 (the base date for the 2017 revaluation).


For 2017, again based on provincial averages, residential properties are set to increase approximately 15%, and commercial properties approximately 30%. It is important to note that this is the anticipated increase to the provincial average for residential and commercial property. Specific local increases in property values between 2013 and 2017 may vary from this figure depending on the overall trend in market values between 2011 and 2015.

NEUTRALITY

While a revaluation updates property assessments, the overall impact on property tax is designed to be revenue neutral on a municipal basis.

Provided that a municipality's budget requirements remain the same in a revaluation year as in the previous year, changes in taxable assessments will only result in changes to tax levels if a property's assessment increases or decreases substantially, relative to the average for that jurisdiction.

Based on the current provincial government practice of establishing common provincial education mill rates, education revenue neutrality and potential education tax shifts will be based on how a specific assessment change relates to the overall provincial average increase in assessments for that same category of properties.



- SAMA AND THE -

The Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency (SAMA) is the recognized leader of property assessments in Saskatchewan. The Agency is responsible for a \$173 Billion property assessment base, which is used by local governments to levy a \$1.83 Billion property tax base.

SAMA conducts revaluations based on a four-year cycle. 2013 was the year of the last revaluation, and the 2017 Revaluation will see assessed values updated to reflect a new base date of January 1, 2015. The legislated base date means that 2017 values reflect a property's value as of January 1, 2015.

The 2017 Revaluation will continue to use the market valuation standard for the assessment of residential and commercial properties. The regulated property assessment valuation standard will continue to be used for the assessment of agricultural land, heavy industrial property, railway roadway, pipelines and resource production equipment (mines and oil and gas wells).

For the 2017 Revaluation, all property types will have their values updated in relation to the **January 1, 2015** base date, regardless of being subject to a market valuation standard or a regulated property valuation standard.

The 2017 Revaluation will seek to stabilize the assessment system from a governance perspective by not introducing any major changes to assessment policy. However, SAMA has introduced a simplification of the cost approach for residential property to increase efficiency and reflect more of an industry standard approach.

VALUATION APPROACHES

There are three generally accepted appraisal techniques used to value property that falls within the market valuation standard: the cost approach, the sales comparison approach and the property income (rental) approach.

The **cost approach** estimates the replacement cost of a building, less depreciation, adding land value primarily based on sales. This approach is most useful when there are few comparable sales. The cost approach will continue to be used in smaller municipalities and for specific property types across Saskatchewan.

The **sales comparison approach** is based on the concept of valuing property based on what similar property in the same market area is selling for. This approach is appropriate for determining property assessments for areas and property types with active sales markets such as residential property in medium to large cities.

The **property income (rental) approach** to value is based on the premise that the value of a property is directly related to the rental income it will generate. The assessment appraiser analyzes the property's ability to produce a future income stream, and then estimates the property's value. The property income (rental) approach provides the most fair, reliable and accurate assessed values for commercial property and rental apartments in areas where there are active lease and rental markets.

To ensure assessed values are as accurate as possible, SAMA's professional assessment appraisers collect and analyze available cost, market and property rental income information and use the valuation approach that provides the best estimates of value for each property type, based on available information.

QUESTIONS FREQUENTLY ASKED REGARDING APPEALING YOUR PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

(The following questions and answers are taken from the pamphlet "Understanding the Property Assessment Appeal Process" from the Saskatchewan Government Relations, Provincial Municipal Relations and Advisory Services)

What is Property Assessment?

Property assessment is the process of determining a property's assessed value as of a specific date for property tax purposes. The assessment provides an estimate of the property's value that reflects typical market conditions.

Local governments use property assessments as a basis for the distribution of property taxes among property owners. <u>Property assessment is not the same as property tax.</u> The assessment of a property is the value assigned to it as the basis for allocating taxes among various classes of property.

Who Can I Contact to Explain My Assessment?

You should start with your administrator of your municipality (Phone 306-771-2284). You can also call SAMA (Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency) (Phone 306-527-8395) as it is the agency that performs Balgonie's assessments.

Preparing the Notice of Appeal Form

When making an assessment appeal, the notice of appeal form must be fully completed. You must provide specific grounds supporting the appeal. You are required to provide as many details as possible and all facts and evidence that an error has been made in the:

- valuation of the property;
- classification of the property;
- preparation of the relevant assessment roll or assessment notice; and/or
- · content of the relevant assessment roll or assessment notice.

The grounds for the appeal must be detailed. Phrases such as "assessment too high" or "assessment too low" are NOT sufficient.

It is your responsibility to make a case to the board of revision. It may be as simple as proving that dimensions or measurements are wrong or that a classification is not correct, or as complex as proving that the value of a property is not fairly assessed compared to another property that is similar in nature.

Regular Assessment Appeals or Simplified Assessment Appeals?

When making regular or simplified assessment appeals, the notice of appeal form must be fully completed. <u>Regular appeal</u> – the appellant must provide specific written grounds supporting the appeal when submitting it to the secretary before the hearing. <u>Simplified appeal</u> - the appellant is not required to submit detailed written grounds to the secretary before the hearing but must have detailed information ready to present to the appeal board.

Can I Base My Appeal on the Fact that I Feel my Taxes are Too High?

NO! Legislation outlines the valid grounds of appeal. Only your property assessment can be appealed, not taxes or mill rates.

2017 property taxes will be set as part of the budget process for the Town Council.

Property taxes have not yet been determined for the 2017 year.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT DOES NOT EQUAL PROPERTY TAX

SAMA's role in determining assessed value for properties is just the first part of a process established by provincial legislation. The second part is application of provincial government established tax policy, such as property classes and percentage of value, and statutory exemptions. The third and final part of the process involves municipalities determining the local mill rate annually based on local budget needs. The province also sets the mill rate for the education sector. Municipalities then multiply the taxable assessment by the local mill rate* to produce property tax levies, also known as your property tax bill.



Permits

The Town of Balgonie requires building permits for anyone building houses, accessory buildings, renovations and decks. Please ensure that you have completed the paperwork with the Town before starting construction.

Permits are also required if you will be moving a structure or demolishing a structure on your property.

Applications can be obtained at the Town Office and permits will be issued once they have been reviewed and approved by the Town and the Building Inspector. Please speak to staff at the Town Office to ensure that you have the information BEFORE moving, demolishing or constructing. The planned construction needs to comply with our Zoning Bylaw and be authorized for development. Please ensure that you have submitted these forms in advance of your project. There may be 2– 3 weeks after submission until a decision has been reached regarding your application.

Current fees for permits are: Accessory Building: \$200.00 (non—insulated) Addition: \$800 Deck: \$200 Garage detached: \$200.00 (non— insulated) Garage detached: \$400.00 (insulated) Demolition: \$200.00 (\$500 refundable clean-up fee)

Moving a building: \$250.00 (\$500.00 refundable clean -up fee)

These costs may change dependent on fees charged to the Town by Professional Building Inspections.





A message from the RM of Edenwold

Canada 150 events announced



To celebrate Canada's birthday, and in the spirit of inter-municipal cooperation, the RM will sponsor and participate in a variety of neighbouring communities events. In



May, the RM of Edenwold Canada 150 Legacy Tree project will see seedlings given out to every elementary school child in Balgonie, White City, Emerald Park, Pilot Butte and the Village of Edenwold.

"When you plant a tree, you're putting a bit of hope into the ground for the future," says Reeve Mitchell Huber. Trees will be sourced from Help International's Shelterbelt

Centre in Weyburn. A threshing bee is scheduled for August. "The bee honours the history of the RM, the pioneers who built our community and allows for people to reach into the past to learn about the level of effort once required to process crops," says Councillor Craig Strudwick.

RM staff and council will be hosting a lunch for William Albert House residents in Emerald Park in September and bringing along Dennis & Curtis Ficor to perform.

Pickle Ball coming to Emerald Park

The Emerald Park tennis courts, at Emerald Park Road and South Plains Road, will be turning into a multiuse recreation space to accommodate both tennis and pickleball. Pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports, with three to four players using paddles to hit a perforated wiffle ball over a net. This request for pickleball was submitted by an Emerald Park resident and discussed at an Official Community Plan early engagement meeting. The Planning Department brought this request to Council and Division 3 Councillor Wayne Joyce did some research on the sport. Council approved the multi-use recreational space at the April 11 RM meeting.

Official Community Plan update

Over 200 residents, landowners, business owners and their employees took the time to respond to the RM of Edenwold's call out to help update the Official Community Plan (OCP). "We received a wide response from rural and urban community members across the municipality," says Senior Municipal Planner Jana Jedlic. "We are thankful to everyone who contributed." Five early community engagement meetings were




held in March in Emerald Park. The RM promoted resident involvement and requests for completion of the OCP survey through their website, print advertisements, email campaigns, phone calls and portable signs. "Next steps are for us to go over the survey feedback, things shared at community meetings and other comments and communications we have received," explains Planner/Development Officer Paige Phillips. "We'll take that information, best planning practices, census information and planning trends data and start updating the Official Community Plan, our maps and the Zoning Bylaw." A draft OCP and Zoning Bylaw will be provided to the public for review and updates on the process will be posted on the RM of Edenwold website.

EMERGENCY KIT BASIC ITEMS



- △ Water at least two litres of water per person per day; include small bottles that can be carried easily in case of an evacuation order

Emergency vehicle kit

Prepare a small kit and keep it in your vehicle.

The basic kit should include:

- △ Blanket
- \triangle Candle in a deep can and matches
- \triangle Extra clothing and shoes
- △ First aid kit with seatbelt cutter
- △ Flashlight (crank or battery-powered)
- △ Food that won't spoil (such as energy bars)
- \triangle List of contact numbers
- △ Radio (crank or battery-powered)
- △ Small shovel, scraper and snowbrush
- △ Warning light or road flares
- \triangle Water
- \triangle Whistle

Recommended additional items to keep in your vehicle

- △ Antifreeze, windshield washer fluid
- \triangle Fire extinguisher
- \triangle Road maps
- △ Sand, salt or cat litter (non-clumping)
- \triangle Tow rope and jumper cables



GET AN EMERGENCY KIT

In an emergency, you will need some basic supplies. You may need to get by without power or tap water. Be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours.

You may have some of the items already, such as food, water and a batteryoperated or crank flashlight. The key is to make sure they are organized and easy to find. Would you be able to find your flashlight in the dark?

Make sure your kit is easy to carry and everyone in the household knows where it is. Keep it in a backpack, duffle bag or suitcase with wheels, in an easy-to-reach, accessible place, such as your front-hall closet. If you have many people in your household, your emergency kit could get heavy. It's a good idea to separate some of these supplies in backpacks. That way, your kit will be more portable and each person can personalize his or her own grab-and-go emergency kit.

Basic emergency kit

- Water at least two litres of water per person per day; include small bottles that can be carried easily in case of an evacuation order
- Food that won't spoil, such as canned food, energy bars and dried foods (replace food and water once a year)
- △ Manual can-opener
- Crank or battery-powered flashlight (and extra batteries)
 - Crank or battery-powered radio (and extra batteries)

△ First aid kit

- Keep a corded phone in your home, as most cordless phones will not work during a power outage.
- Extra keys to your car and house

TIP

KNOW THE RISKS

Although the consequences of various disasters can be similar, knowing the risks in your region can help you better prepare. Across Canada, we face a number of hazards, such as earthquakes in British Columbia, blizzards in Nunavut and tornadoes in Ontario. In addition to natural disasters, there are other types of risks, such as power outages and industrial or transportation accidents. Refer to the province/territory information section at the end of this guide to learn more about the specific risks and to find contact information.

Some of the risks below may be relevant to your community. Find out which ones by visiting www.GetPrepared.gc.ca/risks/risks_e.asp. You may want to identify the most likely ones for easy reference.

Recommended additional items

- Two additional litres of water per person per day for cooking and cleaning
- △ Candles and matches or lighter (place candles in sturdy containers and do not burn unattended)
- Δ Change of clothing and footwear for each household member
- △ Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each household member
- \triangle Toiletries
- △ Hand sanitizer
- \triangle Utensils
- \triangle Garbage bags
- △ Toilet paper
- Household chlorine bleach or water purifying tablets (see sidebar tip for details)
- Basic tools (hammer, pliers, wrench, screwdrivers, work gloves, dust mask, pocket knife)
- Small fuel operated stove and fuel (follow manufacturer's directions and store properly)
- A whistle (in case you need to attract attention)
- Duct tape (to tape up windows, doors, air vents, etc.)

Water can be purified by boiling, adding household bleach or using water purification tablets. The treatment and amount required can vary, depending on the kind of contamination. Check with your municipality for details. When in doubt, do not drink water you suspect may be contaminated.

TIPS

Keep some cash on hand, as automated bank machines and their networks may not work during an emergency. You may have difficulty using debit or credit cards.

SASKATCHEWAN

In Saskatchewan, the Ministry of Corrections, Public Safety and Policing is the lead agency for the province on public safety and security. It works closely with local authorities, as well as the federal and other provincial and territorial governments, to share information and develop emergency plans and strategies to ensure the safety and security of our communities.

The two most common natural and human-caused risks and hazards that occur in Saskatchewan are floods and wild land fires. The province is also exposed to other risks and hazards, which are listed on Page 6 of this guide.

If you are not sure what risks and emergency plans exist in your area, contact your municipality or visit the Saskatchewan Corrections, Public Safety and Policing website at www.cpsp.gov.sk.ca.
